NHWSO SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS Where are they now?

Teresa Maxey Sponaugle

Writer & Educator Greeley, Colorado First Scholarship Recipient – 1980

As they say, "We've come a long way baby," since Teresa Maxey received the first \$500 scholarship presented by the Governing Committee of the Holstein Wives' Scholarship Fund (now NHWSO). Scholarships totaling \$157,000 have now been awarded to 139 junior Holstein members.

Teresa says she was "really broke" and didn't know where the money would come from to go back to school after her sophomore year. Receiving the scholarship meant she could return Colorado State University to finish a degree in Technical Journalism.

Teresa's journalism career began as a free-lance writer for Hoard's Dairyman while a student at CSU. Later she was corporate newsletter editor of the Colorado Public Service Co. She moved on to the Holstein World as an associate editor and feature writer, having the opportunity to meet and interview Holstein breeders and their families throughout the country. Her articles about the early development of embryo transfer appeared in Successful Farming Dairy Extra magazine.

The former Colorado Dairy Princess says she is very thankful for her education and uses it every day. She is finishing 20 years of successfully home schooling her six children, with eight years to go. Oldest son Graydon, 26, graduated from the United States Air Force Academy, is an Air Force Captain and pilot. Daughter Abigail, 23, is married and lives in the Greeley area. Nineteenyear-old twins Nora and Daniel attend the University of Wyoming and Grace College, in Indiana. John, 15, and David, 10, are still enrolled in "mom's" school.

Teresa was so amazed and overwhelmed when she received the scholarship at the 1980 Tennessee Convention that she was truly speechless and couldn't say anything. Now, after all these years, she's glad to be able to say thankyou to everyone who made the scholarship possible, "It meant the world to me. I really appreciate it every day."

Kate Borman Geppert 1987 Scholarship Recipient Managing Editor

Kate Borman Geppert has always strived to have a positive impact on the Holstein and dairy industry. She graduated in 1989 from the University of Missouri with a degree in Agriculture Journalism. She has used her skills as the Managing Editor of the Mid-States Holstein News, a six state Holstein publication that serves the Midwest and Southwest. In addition, she has written numerous agriculture free-lance articles and works with dairy sale catalogs.

Kate was raised on a Registered Holstein Farm in Kingdom City, Missouri. She has been an active participant in the farm her entire life. Recently one of her top cows, Radine Durham Dart was just raised to 2E-93. Her daughter, Sophie, has



caught the Holstein bug and already has 5 Registered Holsteins.

The Holstein industry is very important to Geppert. In 2011, she completed two terms as a Director on the Holstein USA Board of Directors. In addition, she is a graduate of Class 1 of the Young Dairy Leaders Institute and in 2011 was recognized with its Distinguished Alumni Leader. She has also served as President of the Missouri Holstein Association. Attending the Holstein Convention has always been a special experience. Since 1984, she has only missed three conventions. Even though Sophie is only 5, she made every convention and has been a frequent bidder at the NHWSO silent auction.

In 2009, Kate served as President of the University of Missouri Ag Alumni Board. She also served three terms on the Missouri State Milk Board. Currently she is the Dairy Superintendent for the Missouri State Fair where she gets to share the dairy industry with people of all ages during the 11 day event.

Kate appreciates receiving the scholarship and the encouragement of all that were involved. "The scholarship allowed me to develop skills and gain knowledge that I would use throughout my life. In addition, I remember how much fun I had in the interview in Indiana visiting with a great group of dairy women."

That said, the friendships I still maintain from that group of scholarship recipients would have been reward enough, but taking home a scholarship was definitely a bonus. Thanks to a cheese selling business at local farmers' markets during college, along with scholarships like NHWSO, I was able to graduate with a B.S. degree from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo debt free.

The support I've received from people in the Holstein industry throughout my career has always astonished me. I've worked in New York to California and a few places in between, and it seems that no matter where I go I can always find a Holstein connection. I returned to Oregon several years ago to serve as the communication director for Tillamook Cheese. Today I own a boutique public relations and marketing firm located in Portland, OR. While I live in the city, I still enjoy supporting youth programs and started a lease program with 4-H and FFA students a few years ago. I've always believed in giving back to organizations that have given to me, and am happy to donate to the annual NHWSO silent auction. NHWSO SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

An applicant must be a Junior state and national member, have a dairy farm background and have completed one year at a college, university, or tech school, majoring in an ag-related course of study. Applicants must be present for a personal interview held during the Holstein USA National Convention. Scholarship winners agree to use the scholarship award within 12 months from the date received. Awards are made payable to the student's college, university or technical school with instructions with instructions to credits the student's account for the amount of the award.
